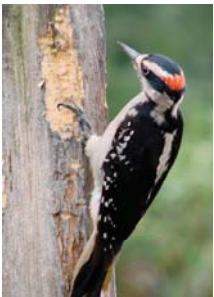
Start a Habitat Project at your home and school. Involve your friends and family. Even small patios and balconies can provide a wildlife habitat. Once you have an element of each of the five habitat components, you are eligible to be certified by the National Wildlife Federation.



1. Water Sources – birdbath, pond, hose dripper, stream, saucer of shallow water



2. Food Sources – native plants for nectar, seeds and berries, bird feeders

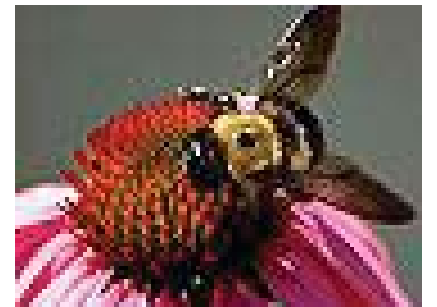


3. Places for Cover – thickets, brush piles, roosting box for shelter

4. Places to Raise Young – dense shrubs, nesting box, trees and snags



5. Sustainable Gardening – garden without chemicals or pesticides, use soaker hoses, mulch, compost and rain barrels
